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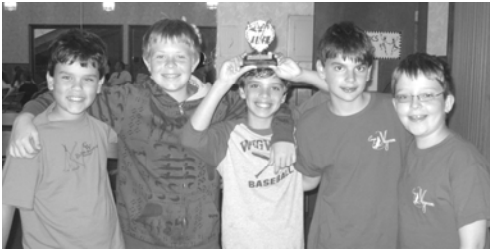

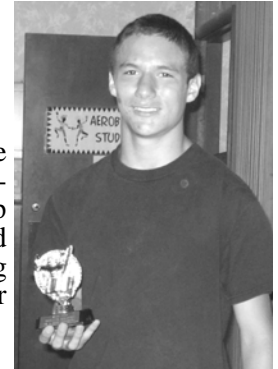

## 6TH ANNUAL CAMP SPELLING BEE SPONSORED BY

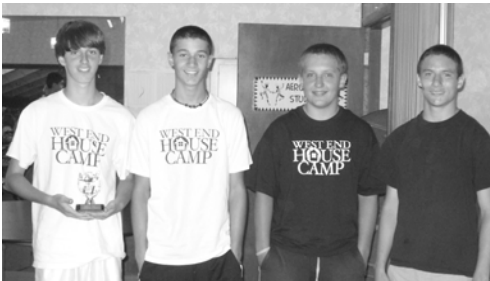


1st place Team 12 & Under - Camp Wigwam

# Legislative & Government Affairs - News from the Maine Youth Camp Association

MYCA is a sister organization to the Maine Youth Camping Foundation. It focuses on governmental relations for summer camps in Maine. It is a 501 (c) 4 non-profit.



## CAMP LICENSE FEE INCREASES

MYCA has continued to stay involved with the development of new licensing fees for summer camps. Beginning in 2011 the State's Health Inspection Program must fully fund its inspection program from license fees. The fees have not been raised in decades. MYCA members were given several opportunities for input on the proposed fees. No date is set for the required public hearing, but MYCA members will be notified.

The current proposed annual license fees for 2011 are: Day camps, trip & travel camps (\$75); Resident Camp, fewer than 100 campers (\$155); Resident Camp, 100 to 200 campers (\$175). (\$175 is also the maximum fee for nonprofits camps even if over 200 campers.) Resident Camp, more than 200 campers (\$225). Increases are also planned annually through 2014. According to the law passed this spring, license fees cannot exceed \$300.

## SWIM PERMITS IN EFFECT

Youth camps are now required to obtain a swim area permit from the Maine Department of Conservation. The \$150 fee is waived for summer camps due to the successful efforts of MYCA. The navigational rules that determine the type of lines and markers that can be used in a swim area will be open to revision this fall. MYCA camps will be notified of the process so they can provide input.

## SWIMMING POOL & SPA RULES AND LICENSE NOW REQUIRED

Maine's swimming pool rules have been significantly revised and do apply to summer camps with pools or spas. For the first time, pools will also need a state license to operate, adding an additional fee for camps with pools. MYCA members with pools have received a full packet of information on the rules. ## MYCF MEMBERS ARE NOW MYCA MEMBERS TOO

When a camp or individual now joins The Maine Youth Camping Foundation (MYCF), they automatically also become members of the Maine Youth Camp Association (MYCA). This is the result of a MYCA by-laws change this spring. Previously, MYCA was not a membership organization. With the change, its board is elected by the membership, and a portion of dues paid to MYCF is allocated to MYCA dues. Day to day, this change will not be noticeable to members. However, at the annual meeting, two membership meetings will be held, one for MYCF and one for MYCA, to permit elections and conduct required annual business.

## ONE STEP CLOSER TO GREATER CHILD PROTECTION

HR 1469 Provides Access to Fingerprint-Based FBI Background Checks for Youth-Serving Organizations



In July the House of Representatives in Washington passed a historic bill aimed at protecting our nation's children. Passed with overwhelming support, HR 1469, The Child Protection Improvements Act, moves this country one step closer to a law that will allow camps, children's groups, and other nonprofit organizations to gain access to FBI criminal background checks. The bill will allow youth-serving organizations access to timely, inexpensive fingerprint-based checks of the FBI's criminal records database. ACA was one of several groups participating in the pilot program, which found that of nearly 90,000 checks conducted, 6.1 percent returned with records that deemed applicants unfit to work with children. Forty percent of these were convicted in another state, meaning only a national search would have caught the criminal record. A significant number of these individuals showed a different name on their record than the one they used to apply. The Senate must still vote to approve the bill.

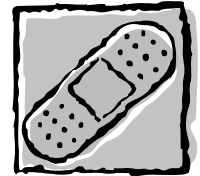
### WILDERNESS MEDICINE

#### COURSES OFFERED BY WILDERNESS MEDICAL ASSOCIATES

Two wilderness medicine courses are offered each year on the Chewonki campus in Wiscasset. Trip leaders, outdoor professionals and outdoor enthusiasts who want sound strategies for dealing with emergency medical situations in wilderness settings benefit from these thorough programs. The internationally renowned staff of Wilderness Medical Associates (WMA) teaches these intensive courses. Instructors combine morning lectures with realistic simulations that are videotaped and critiqued. WMA courses are widely considered the most complete medical training for outdoor professionals.

**Please note:** These courses fill early. Advance registration is recommended.

**January 2, 2011—January 5, 2011**  
**Wilderness Advanced First Aid**  
**(Wafa)**



Wilderness Advanced First Aid is a comprehensive medical training course designed for outdoor recreationalists or wilderness trip leaders who venture into moderately remote and challenging environments. The content is significantly more detailed than the Wilderness First Aid course, including emphasis on common critical body system problems and environmental topics.  
**Cost:** \$375, \$495 with room and board.

**January 7- 10, 2011**

**Wafa to WFR Bridge (Wilderness First Responder)**

The Wafa to WFR Bridge course upgrades the WMA™ Wilderness Advanced First Aid to a Wilderness First Responder (WFR) in 4 days. This course must be taken within three years of receiving the Wilderness Medical Associates' Wafa certificate. The WFR is the definitive medical training course for all outdoor professionals and enthusiasts.

**Cost:** \$375, \$495 with room and board. Lodging starts on evening of Jan. 1 for those traveling from afar.

Cost for those taking both courses to receive a WFR certification: \$625, or \$875 with full room and board.

**MANITOU**  
CAMP MANITOU FOR BOYS ON EAST LAKE

Featuring MYCF camps in order of  
founding dates

Camp Manitou for Boys was founded in 1947 by Sis & Henry Marcus. The Marcus family operated Manitou for the next half century before selling the camp to Jon Deren and Dave Schiff, two former bunkmates who grew up together at Manitou. Under current leadership, Manitou has stayed true to the principals and traditions of its founding family while upgrading the facility, diversifying the program and expanding its services.

Manitou currently serves about 300 boys, aged 7-16. While they offer two half sessions, the majority of campers attend camp for the full 7-week summer. Campers hail from 4 continents, 7 countries and 19 different states.

The morning program provides campers the choice of three periods of instructionals. Depending upon weather, campers can expect to participate in as many as 30 different 3-day land, waterfront and creative instructionals during the summer.



Manitou has always been strong in land sports. Sharon (MA) baseball coach Joel Peckham has run the baseball program for over 40 summers. Arlington (NY) lacrosse coach Andy Arenson brought lacrosse to Manitou 35 summers ago. Newton South (MA) athletic director Scott Perrin returns to camp this summer as the head of basketball. Scott grew up at Manitou during the 1980s. Dozens of current and former college athletes cite the coaching and competition at Manitou as key factors in their athletic development. Athletes who honed their skills at Manitou include University of Miami Baseball Captain Greg Lovelady, MLS All-Star Jeff Cameron, Colorado Avalanche #1 pick Kevin Shattenkirk and Ultimate Fighter, Kenny Florian.

The last decade has seen tremendous growth in Manitou's waterfront and creative programs. The waterski program truly took off when Pete Hanson arrived from New Zealand 10 summers ago. Pete, along with his "mates" from Maketu have made wakeboarding and wake surfing the rage at Manitou. Four professional quality boats are filled with eager kids most of the day. Sailing, kayaking and scuba have also experienced significant upswings in popularity over the last decade.



Creative programs continue to prosper. Manitou's strong theater tradition dates back to the 80s, but Steve Borowka and his McCarter Theater (Princeton NJ) cohorts truly transformed Manitou dramatics. Working out of a dedicated state-of-the-art 400-seat theater, Borowka produces four college league plays and a final musical review each summer. Manitou's theater program has grown so much that "Acting Manitou" received its own dedicated camp (built on adjoining land, but completely separate from Manitou) two summers ago.

College League occupies most afternoons and has become the most popular activity at Manitou. The four college league teams compete in a myriad of sports as well as a track meet, swim meet, scavenger hunt, and four-way tug-o-wars. Campers and staff proudly sport their college apparel throughout the summer. Manitou is a member of the Central Maine Camp League, playing the vast majority of its intercamp with fellow league members Caribou, Androscoggin and Cobbossee. The league enables maximum participation with minimal disruption to the camp schedule and very manageable travel.

During changeover, all the full-session kids depart on trips. This summer's docket includes Sunday River for the youngest campers, Six Flags/Basketball Hall-of-Fame for the 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> graders, Surfing/Boston for the 8<sup>th</sup> graders, Cedar Point/Pro Football Hall-of-Fame for the 9<sup>th</sup> graders and Martha's Vineyard for the 10<sup>th</sup> graders. The "Adventure Trip" (surfing, white water kayaking, mountain biking) is offered as an alternative for the more outdoors-oriented campers. Other overnights during the summer include whitewater rafting, Bar Harbor and Baxter State Park.

Camp concludes with Color War. Four challenging days of spirited competition reinforces many of the lessons of Manitou – responsibility, focus, sportsmanship, competition, teamwork, family - and serves as a fitting apex to the summer. The last five years have been especially eventful at Manitou. Several new buildings were erected, including a 15,000 square foot athletic center with a wood basketball court and indoor batting cage. The Manitou Camps Foundation now funds several pre- and post-camp programs that provide summer camp experiences to deserving populations.

As it enters its 64<sup>th</sup> summer, Manitou looks forward to reuniting with its camp family and providing them with the best possible summer experience.
